Here are a few tips on how to strengthen that partnership at our upcoming parent-teacher conference...

- **Prepare for the conference:** Keep a folder with tests, papers, or any other topics you want to address. Do your research by talking to your child; find out how he/she is doing in their classes
- **Keep the teacher informed:** Teachers appreciate knowing what's going on with your child. It's important to communicate medical or family issues in your child's life.
- **Take Notes:** They will help you remember the good points and areas for concern. It's good to have notes to look back on so you can target the areas that may need improvement.
- **Follow up:** Don't be afraid to ask for a parent-teacher conference at any time during the year if you need or desire additional information.
- **Work together:** Partner with the teacher by being a team player. Think: "how can we work together to resolve this issue?"
- **Ask questions:** It's your turn to ask questions. Make a list beforehand so you'll remember your important points.
- **The communication tool:** Tell the teacher your preferred method of communication: *phone, email, or notes*
- **Ask how you can be involved:** Involvement is about being aware of what's happening with your child's education. Inquire about what can you do at home to support what your child is learning at school? How can you help the teacher in planning for events? Meetings? Trips?
